# SURVEY ON 1999-2000 STATE TUITION, FEES, & FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE POLICIES FOR PUBLIC COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

#### **Four-Year Institutions**

This survey solicits information on state-level policies and procedures governing **four-year public** higher education tuition, fees, and student financial assistance. For simplicity, the term "tuition" as used in this survey includes all standard student charges including required "education fees" in states that prohibit tuition per se.

Some questions are intended to update and clarify information collected through the last SHEEO/WICHE survey on this topic in 1996. Other questions are new or expanded to reflect the changing financial and political circumstances in which tuition policies are set. This is not a survey of the actual rates or amounts of current tuition, since there are already several sources for those data.
