

Digital Equity

The condition in which individuals and communities have the information technology capacity that is needed for full participation in the society and economy of the United States.



Digital Inclusion

- Reliable fixed and wireless broadband internet service;
- Internet-enabled devices that meet the needs of the user; and
- Applications and online content designed to enable and encourage self-sufficiency, participation, and collaboration; and
- Includes—
 - Obtaining access to digital literacy training;
 - The provision of quality technical support; and
 - Obtaining basic awareness of measures to ensure online privacy and cybersecurity.



- The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) includes a \$65B broadband package.
- This includes the Digital Equity Act programs, administered by the U.S.
 Department of Commerce's National Telecommunications & Information
 Administration (NTIA).
- The first part of the Digital Equity Act funds the development of state digital equity plans.
- All states, territories, and the District of Columbia are currently developing their digital equity plans.

- Individuals who live in covered households (household income < 150% of poverty level)
- Aging individuals
- Incarcerated individuals, other than individuals incarcerated in a Federal facility
- Veterans
- Individuals with disabilities
- Individuals with a language barrier, e.g., English learners & individuals with low literacy levels
- Individuals who are members of a racial or ethnic minority group
- Individuals who primarily reside in a rural area



Given their experiences navigating the pandemic, identifying barriers and strategies, developing trusted relationships in communities, and building digital skills, education leaders can provide essential perspectives on how to meet the needs of "covered populations" required by the BIL.

Public Notice Posting of State and Territory BEAD and Digital Equity Plans/Proposals

Public engagement, stakeholder coordination, and transparency are a central part of working to close the digital divide. Both of NTIA's State-formula grant programs, the **Broadband Equity and Deployment (BEAD) Program** and the **State Digital Equity Planning Grant Program**, have public disclosure and comment requirements to facilitate community engagement and input into each State and Territory's plans and proposals for using grant funds. Below are public comment and disclosure links hosted by States and Territories to facilitate public input into key elements of their Broadband, Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program plans and proposals and the State Digital Equity Plans. 

- A political subdivision, agency, or instrumentality of a state
- An Indian Tribe, an Alaska Native entity, or a Native Hawaiian organization
- A foundation, corporation, institution, or association that is a non-for-profit entity and not a school
- A community anchor institution (e.g., library, IHE)
- A local educational agency
- An entity that carries out a workforce development program
- A partnership between any of the entities

- Develop and implement digital inclusion activities that benefit covered populations
- Facilitate the adoption of broadband by covered populations in order to provide educational and employment opportunities
- Implement training programs for covered populations or other workforce development programs
- Make available equipment, instrumentation, networking capability,
 hardware and software, or digital network technology for broadband services
 to covered populations at low or no cost
- Construct, upgrade, expend, or operate new or existing public access computing centers for covered populations through community anchor institutions
