

Features of Effective State Financial Aid

GENEROUS & WELL-TARGETED	TRANSPARENT & PREDICTABLE	SIMPLE TO ACCESS & RETAIN
Need-based, meaning students from low-income families receive the largest awards and all the funds are distributed to students with financial need Cover all or almost all of the cost of college, including living expenses, when combined with the Pell Grant for all who qualify First dollar relative to the Pell Grant, freeing students to use the Pell Grant for living expenses Can be combined with other state grant aid to provide the maximum support to qualifying students	Criteria and award levels are publicly available through simple tables and a financial aid estimator Funding is an entitlement and is guaranteed to all who qualify – not distributed on a first-come, first-serve basis, no priority deadline, and remains consistent and predictable from year-to-year (e.g., doesn't vary with annual appropriations) Award amount is clearly stated on institutional financial aid award letters	FAFSA alone (or an alternative and equally simple form for students who are undocumented) unlocks access to the program with no additional application; one consolidated state financial aid program, or at least one application for all types of aid No requirements beyond income (e.g., no criminal background check, age restrictions, time since graduation, occupational limitations, GPA cutoffs, restrictions on part-time enrollment, community service requirements, etc.) Rules align with the Pell Grant (e.g., satisfactory academic progress
Available to students who are undocumented, justice-impacted, attending part-time, parents, older, and/or nontraditional		(SAP) requirements, appeals process, withdrawal deadline, number of semesters/credits covered are the same as the federal process ensuring that students won't lose

retaining the Pell Grant)

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
