


#### Most U.S. Parents Prefer Their Child Pursue a Two- or Four-Year Degree Immediately After High School

#### Democrats and college grads more strongly prefer a college pathway




#### American trust in higher education rebounded slightly in 2025, but remains 15 percentage points lower than a decade ago

# Confidence has declined – and rebounded – among adults of all political and educational backgrounds



How much confidence do you, yourself, have in each of the following -- a great deal, quite a lot, some or very little?



Americans' confidence is rooted in their perceptions of a degree's cost and relevance, as well as institutions' political climate on campus






Please indicate to what extent you agree or disagree that higher education leads to each of the following outcomes in the United States.

Do you think \_\_\_\_ charge fair prices for what they offer students and graduates? **% Yes** 





### Nearly half of adults underestimate average tuition by \$5,000 or more, and about one in three overestimate by at least \$5,000

The average yearly cost of attendance at 4-year, in-state U.S. public colleges is about \$25,000. This is called the "sticker price," and it includes tuition, room, and board, books and fees.


How much do you think the average in-state student at a public college actually pays per year, after grants and scholarships they receive from the college?

# Even with limited understanding of actual costs, most current and prospective students agree that investing in a degree is/would be worth the cost





While students believe liberal views are more welcome on campus, Republicans believe the gap is narrower than Democrats


